

FIRE COURSES

Sprinklers I & II

February 18-19 - #26697

16 hours

This course will introduce the firefighter to the concept of automatic fire protection systems and how this concept affects not only the firefighter, but everyone who lives within the respective jurisdiction. Types of sprinkler systems and operations of these as it pertains to fire suppression will be covered. This class will meet all objectives required for NC Certification. The student must pass the practical and written test to receive credit. Class begins Saturday, February 18 at 8 a.m.

Personal Protective Equipment I & II (NFPA 1403 Class)

February 18-19 - #26692

16 hours

This course will also give credit for FIP-5502 Rescue Technician General – Personal Protective Equipment and FIP-5509 Rescue Technician Vehicle Machinery Rescue Personal Protective Equipment.

The firefighter candidate will be presented the function of each article of protective equipment, the leading causes of death of firefighters, and the hazardous environments requiring use of protective equipment. In addition, there is a great deal of information covering the SCBA and its use. The student must pass the practical and written test to receive credit. Student must bring full turn-out gear, SCBA, and spare SCBA cylinder. Class begins Saturday, February 18 at 8 a.m.

Salvage I & II

February 18 (One day class – Saturday) - #26696

7 hours

This course will enable the firefighter candidate to demonstrate various folds, rolls, deployment of salvage covers, and the construction and use of water chutes and catchalls. In addition, the course will cover the maintenance of and other uses for salvage covers. The student must pass the practical and written test to receive credit. Student must bring full turn-out gear. Class will be held Saturday, February 18 beginning at 8 a.m.

Portable Extinguishers I & II (NFPA 1403 Class)

February 18 (One day class – Saturday) - #26791

6 hours

This course will present the firefighter candidate with the proper use of portable extinguishers and the demonstration of the actual extinguishment of a Class A and B fire. The student must pass the practical and written test to receive credit. Student must bring full turn-out gear. Class will be held Saturday, February 18 beginning at 8 a.m.

Overhaul I & II (NFPA 1403 Class)

February 19 (One day class – Sunday) - #26717

7 hours

The material presented in this course will deal with the purpose of overhaul, how to recognize the location of hidden fires and how to expose them, and present the duties of the firefighters left at the fire scene for security. This course will cover the indicators of structural instability and the firefighter's role in the preserving of evidence of fire cause and origin. The student must pass the practical and written test to receive credit. Student must bring full turn-out gear, SCBA, and spare SCBA cylinder. Class will be held Sunday, February 19 beginning at 8 a.m.

Building Construction I & II - #26698

February 18-19

16 hours

This course will introduce the firefighter to the different types of construction taking place in the real world of today. Building construction type is a very important factor that must be identified during preincident surveys or during scene size-up. Building construction materials will be covered in all aspects from the positives and negatives of how they are used. The student must pass the written test to receive credit. Class begins Saturday, February 18 at 8 a.m.

Fire Alarms & Communications I & II - #26690

February 18-19

16 hours

This course will present the firefighter candidate with the proper use of communication equipment and the procedures for receiving any type alarm.

This course provides for the defining of the policies and procedures concerning the ordering and transmitting of multiple alarms and the action to be taken upon receipt of these signals. The student must pass the practical and written test to receive credit. Class begins Saturday, February 18 at 8 a.m.

Fire Behavior I & II (NFPA 1403 Class) - #26691

February 18-19

14 hours

This course will present the firefighter candidate with the stages of fire, the products of combustion, and the methods of heat transfer. The student must pass the written test to receive credit. Class begins Saturday, February 18 at 8 a.m.

Fire Hose, Streams, & Appliances I & II (NFPA 1403 Class) - #26688

February 17-19

19 hours

The firefighter candidate will be presented the types and applications of hose, nozzles, adaptors and tools carried on a pumper. In addition, the correct application of fire streams will be included. This course will enable the firefighter candidate to demonstrate the use of hoses and nozzles, adaptors and appliances and the information needed to conduct an annual service test of fire hose. The student must pass the practical and written test to receive credit. Student must bring full turn-out gear. Class begins Friday, February 17 at 7 p.m.

Fire Department Orientation & Safety I & II (NFPA 1403 Class) - #26689

February 17-19

19 hours

This course will enable the firefighter to become aware of the overall operations of the department and understand their position in the organization. Course topics include a review of basic and advanced safety regulations and the firefighter's responsibility to comply with those regulations and a review of the elements of a departmental safety program and the hazards related to fire protection. The student must pass the practical and written test to receive credit. Student must bring full turn-out gear, SCBA, and spare SCBA cylinder. Class begins Friday, February 17 at 7 p.m.

**Fire Prevention, Education and
Cause Determination I & II -
#26687**

February 17-19

19 hours

This course will present the causes of fires and how to prevent them. The course also deals with the importance of inspections and education programs and how to conduct a public fire education program. This course will enable the firefighter candidate to prepare a pre-fire plan, conduct a building fire safety survey and be presented with school exit drill procedures. Also, this course covers the most common fire hazards and the cause and point of origin of fires. The student must pass the practical and written test to receive credit. Class begins Friday, February 17 at 7 p.m.

Forcible Entry I & II - #26693

February 18-19

14 hours

This course will cover all the related objectives to the subject of forcible entry for Firefighter Levels I and II. The student must pass the practical and written test to receive credit. Student must bring full turn-out gear. Class begins Saturday, February 18 at 8 a.m.

Ropes I & II - #26695

February 18-19

14 hours

This course will introduce the firefighter to one of the most important and routinely used tools in the fire service. The student will learn how to select the proper rope for a given task based on the material that it is constructed of and



the type construction method. The student will also learn the primary uses of rope in the fire service, how to tie knots utilized in the fire service and how to properly inspect, maintain and store rope. The student must pass the practical and written test to receive credit. Class begins Saturday, February 18 at 8 a.m.

TECHNICAL RESCUE COURSES

TR VMR Stabilization & Extrication - #26713

February 18-19

16 hours

This class will present the Technical Rescuer the proper steps to stabilize a vehicle on four wheels, a side-resting vehicle and a roof-resting vehicle. The Technical Rescuer will also be introduced to procedures for the following: opening a jammed door using a hinge attack and a latch attack, how to create a third door, total door removal, sidewall removal, working with a collapsed roof, creating the roof flap, C-B-A roof pillar cut, procedures for total roof removal, trunk tunneling, through the floor access, how to displace a steering column, dash roll, removal and/or relocation of pedals, and how to remove and/or relocate seats. The student must pass the practical and written test to receive credit. Student must bring full turn-out gear or rescue turn-out gear. Class begins Saturday, February 18 at 8 a.m.

TR Helicopter Transport - #26712

February 18 (One day class – Saturday)

7 hours

This class will present the Technical Rescuer general operating and safety guidelines when working with helicopters at emergency scenes for the protection of on-scene emergency providers, flight crews, and the civilian population. The student must pass the practical and written test to receive credit. Class will be held Saturday, February 18 beginning at 8 a.m.

TR Rescue Equipment - #26720
February 19 (One day class – Sunday)
7 hours

This class will introduce the Technical Rescuer to the operation and function of various tools and equipment commonly used in rescue operations. This course will also present procedures for care, inspection, and maintenance of personal protective equipment, tactical equipment, and apparatus. The value of periodic inspection and maintenance to reduce the chances of unexpected equipment failure, performance failure, disabling injuries, and fatalities will be discussed. The student must pass the practical and written test to receive credit. Class begins Sunday, February 19 at 8 a.m.

TR Rescue Rigging - #26715
February 18-19
16 hours

This course will present to the Technical Rescuer the proper use of ropes and other related rescue rigging equipment used during rescue operations. This course will involve the setup of various ladder and timber configuration for technical rescues. The student must pass the practical and written test to receive credit. Student will need helmet, gloves, and protective shoes. Class begins Saturday, February 18 at 8 a.m.

TR Victim Management - #26716

February 18-19

16 hours

This course will present to the Technical Rescuer the proper method for the safe movement of patients from a hazardous situation to one of safety. Various lifts, carries, drags, and stretchers will be discussed with the safety and well being of patients and rescuers given priority. This course will also introduce various search methods used for the rescue of lost individuals. The student must pass the practical and written test to receive credit. Class begins Saturday, February 18 at 8 a.m.

DRIVER OPERATOR

Emergency Vehicle Driver - #26686

February 17-19

19 hours

This course will deal with the safe operation of emergency vehicles, driving skills, legal implications of emergency driving and departmental standard operating procedures. This course is a stand-alone certification and is also a prerequisite to Driver Operator certification by the North Carolina Fire Rescue Commission. The student must pass the practical and written test to receive credit. **No student under the age of 18 may enroll in this class.** Class begins Friday, February 17 at 7 p.m.

Driver Operator: Pump Maintenance - #26699

February 18-19

16 hours

This course will detail all portions of preventative maintenance on various pumps. It will also cover proper recording, keeping procedures and the proper methods to clean and maintain nozzles, appliances, and SCBA equipment on a pumper. The student must pass the practical and written test to receive credit. **No student under the age of 18 may enroll in this class.** Class begins Saturday, February 18 at 8 a.m.

Driver Operator: Intro to Aerials - #26702

February 18-19

16 hours

This course will introduce personnel to various types of aerial fire apparatus and their applications to emergency operations. It will include job and individual performance issues; how to identify various types of aerial apparatus, features of the design and application of aerials and elevating platforms. It will also review unsafe acts as it relates to weather and terrain in placement and use of aerials. It will also review unsafe acts as it relates to driver operator errors. The student must pass the practical and written test to receive credit. **No student under the age of 18 may enroll in this class.** Class begins Saturday, February 18 at 8 a.m.

Driver Operator Pumps: Pump Hydraulics - #26701

February 18-19

16 hours

This course will detail vacuum pressure, normal operating pressure, residual, head and static pressure as it relates to the operation of a fire pumper during an emergency operation. It will describe factors related to friction loss and detail measures to reduce friction loss. It will also review nozzle reaction force and show methods to calculate this force. Finally, a review of mathematical calculations utilized in fire service hydraulics will be reviewed and discussed. The student must pass the practical and written tests to receive credit. **Students should bring a calculator. No student under the age of 18 may enroll in this class.** Class begins Saturday, February 18 at 8 a.m.

SPECIALTY COURSES

National Fire Academy Leadership I - #26707

February 18-19

16 hours

During this course students will learn the applications and basic skills needed to perform effectively as a leader in the fire service. Topics will include: techniques and approaches to problem solving, identifying and assessing the needs of the company officer, how to effectively run meetings in the fire service environment, and decision making for the company officer. Class begins Saturday, February 18 at 8 a.m.

National Fire Academy Leadership II - #26710

February 18-19

16 hours

This course will introduce personnel to the various skills and tools needed to perform effectively as an officer in the fire service environment. Topics will include: resourcefulness, ethics, use and abuse of power at the officer level, and management of the multiple roles of a company officer. The course is designed for fire or rescue personnel due for promotion, training officers, unit commanders, line fire officers, or program supervisors seeking a promotion. Class begins Saturday, February 18 at 8 a.m.

Engine Company Operations - #26705

February 19 (One day class – Sunday)

8 hours

This course will cover a wide array of topics and hands-on instruction for the new structural firefighter or officer that has limited experience in the field. Some of the topics include: personnel assignments and operations at structural fires, tactical assignments, first due and subsequent arriving engine companies, introduction for methods of personnel accountability, assignments and tactical priorities, size-up for the attack team, equipment for each firefighter, water supply options and stream selection, and ventilation considerations. Student must bring full turn-out gear. Class will be held Sunday, February 19 at 8 a.m.

Truck Company Operations - #26718

February 18 (One day class – Saturday)

8 hours

This class will demonstrate to fire personnel, the skills needed for a successful outcome on the fireground. Whether your department has a truck company or not, every fire needs truck company skills performed. Skills to be covered include: ground ladder placement, primary searches, ventilating peaked and flat roofs, forcing doors, saw use, searching with water cans, horizontal ventilation, and vent/enter/search. Student must bring full turn-out gear. Class begins Saturday, February 18 at 8 a.m.

National Fire Academy Calling the Mayday - #26936

February 17-19

18 hours

This course will introduce the most critical emergency radio message a firefighter will ever be forced to transmit “Mayday”. This is a two segment class open to ALL FIREFIGHTING PERSONNEL. Students will be tested in two separate segments. All personnel will be allowed to participate in the classroom session. Students completing the additional practical session will be eligible for an additional NFA certificate of completion. The firefighter must demonstrate the ability to call MAYDAY under various emergency situations a firefighter may find himself/herself in. The minimum: being trapped or lost in a room, having something collapse on him/her. Prerequisites: successful completion of Firefighter I PPE. Full turn-out gear, SCBA, and spare SCBA cylinder required. Class begins Friday, February 17 at 7 p.m.

Poultry House Fire - #26711

February 18-19

14 hours

This course will cover the hazards and challenges if a fire ignites in a poultry house. Poultry production in North Carolina comprises nearly 39.1% of North Carolina’s total farm income. Over 4,400 farmers grow poultry in North Carolina.

These farms operate large buildings to raise poultry, averaging 25,000 square feet each. The buildings can pose many hazards and challenges if a fire ignites. This course will look at these challenges, inform the students how to utilize the building’s features to reduce fire damage and increase safety awareness while operating at a poultry house incident through lecture and practical exercises. A portion of the class will be held off campus. Class begins Saturday, February 18 at 8 a.m.

Agriculture Rescue - #26790

February 17-19

28 hours

During this course students will learn and put to use applications for a positive outcome in Agriculture Rescue. This course will teach students how to remove



victims from tractor rollover, auger entrapment, grain bin entrapment, and bailer entrapments. Students will also learn the techniques for victim removal from PTO shafts, lifting and stabilization of heavy duty farm equipment along with patient packaging. The student must pass the practical and written test to receive credit. Prerequisite: successful completion of TR General. Students should bring proper turn-out gear for weather along with coveralls, helmets, headlamps for night operations, boots and gloves. A portion of the class will be held off campus. Class begins Friday, February 17 at 8 a.m.

Meth Labs, Indoor Growth, Powders, IED, & HME - #26792

February 18 (One day class – Saturday)

7 hours

Public safety agencies are increasingly responding to “special operations” incidents such as chemical suicides, Homemade Explosives (HME), clandestine drug labs, indoor marijuana growth and crimes involving chemicals. Response operations at these current and emerging threats can expose responders to a wide range of hazards such as criminal elements and a multitude of chemical and explosive hazards. Session addresses recognition, identification and response issues that first responders must deal with prior to the arrival of those teams with specialized training and equipment. Class begins Saturday, February 18 at 8:30 a.m.

Advanced Cardiac Life Support Core Instructor Course Module - #26373

February 18 (One day class – Saturday)

8 hours

The ACLS Instructor course is designed to certify individuals to teach the Advanced Cardiac Life Support Provider course according to American Heart Association guidelines. This course teaches instruction skills in general, as well as specific ACLS teaching skills. Prerequisites: Documentation of affiliation with an AHA Training Center, Core Instructor Course and certifications for Healthcare Provider and ACLS Provider. Required: ACLS Provider Manual, ACLS Instructor Manual, plus \$7.50 certification fee. The CPR Instructor course is designed to certify individuals to teach the BLS course through the American Heart Association. Prerequisites: Certification for Healthcare Provider and documentation of affiliation with an AHA Training Center. Required: Core Instructor Course Manual, BLS Provider Manual, BLS Instructor Manual, plus \$7.50 certification fee. Pediatric Advanced Life Support Core Instructor Course Module - #26375

February 19 (One day class – Sunday)

6 hours

The PALS Instructor course is designed to certify individuals to teach the Pediatric Advanced Life Support Provider course according to American Heart Association guidelines. This course teaches instruction skills in general, as well as specific PALS teaching skills. Prerequisites: Documentation of affiliation with an AHA Training Center, Core Instructor Course and certifications for Healthcare Provider and PALS Provider. Required: PALS Provider Manual, PALS Instructor Manual, plus \$7.50 certification fee. For additional information, contact Tony Ramsey at 336.224.4788 or tramsey@davidsonccc.edu. Class begins Sunday, February 19 at 9 a.m.

MEDICAL COURSES - PROVIDER LEVEL

International Trauma Life Support - #26370

February 17-19

15 Hours

This course (formerly BTLS) teaches emergency medical personnel the proper evaluation and treatment of a patient who has sustained a traumatic injury. The course includes both basic and advanced life support procedures. Prerequisite: EMT or higher medical credential. Required: *Brady: International Trauma Life Support, 6th Edition*, and \$18 certification fee. Class begins Friday, February 17 at 7 p.m.

Pediatric Advanced Life Support/AHA Provider Course - #26374

February 19 (One day class – Sunday)

6 hours

This PALS Provider course is designed to prepare healthcare providers to recognize and treat infants and children experiencing life-threatening medical emergencies. Emphasis is placed on recognition of signs and symptoms as well as invasive skills needed to stabilize the patient's condition. Prerequisite: Certification/License as a Paramedic, RN, MD, or equivalent. Required: AHA PALS Student Textbook. Class begins Sunday, February 19 at 9 a.m.

Advanced Cardiac Life Support/AHA Provider Course - #26371

February 18 (One day class – Saturday)

8 hours

This ACLS Provider course is designed to educate emergency medical personnel in Advanced Cardiac Life Support through the American Heart Association guidelines. This course teaches the proper evaluation and treatment skills for the cardiac patient. Students should be advanced medical professionals (Paramedic, RN, PA, MD). Required: AHA ACLS Provider Manual. Class begins Saturday, February 18 at 8 a.m.

MEDICAL SPECIALTY COURSE

15 hours

Instructor: Bob Page, Internationally known speaker, instructor, author and paramedic.

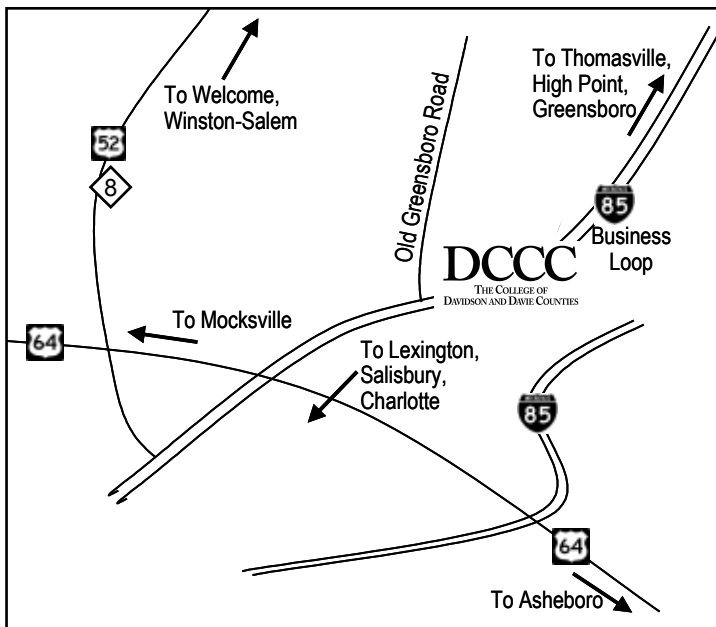

Participation Fees

Some courses have additional certification fees and/or require textbooks.

Verification Requirements

Student will not be registered in a course until the College receives a release form which includes the signature of the appropriate Chief/Training Officer (See Registration Information for Affirmation Statement). This requirement does not apply to medical courses.

Registration and Check In

The purpose of the school is to make quality training available to as many dedicated emergency responders as possible. Every effort has been made to accommodate maximum participation in the course of registration. Should your first choice be filled, you will be assigned to your second or third choice.

You will be notified only if you do not get your first choice of classes.

Students that do not pre-register for Emergency Services College will need to go to the 2nd floor of the J. Bryan Brooks Student Center to register for the class before it starts. Office hours will be Friday 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. and Saturday from 7 a.m.-9:30 a.m. Refunds will only be returned if the College cancels classes due to low enrollment. The student must contact the fire coordinator to complete paperwork for a refund.

Weekend Information

Most classes will be held on campus. There will be class rosters with building and room numbers posted on the entrance to each building. Please look for your name, class title and room number upon arrival.

Please note the requirements for each course and bring appropriate equipment needed to complete the class.
